Recently, two members of the Oblate Communications team were invited to come to Saint Joseph's, Colwyn Bay to meet the parishes' newly established communications team.

I, along with Jenny Forti, the newest addition to our team, having just started in her new role as Communications Officer on June 1st, were delighted to accept this invitation and so we travelled from Crewe (via Ireland and Anglesey) on June 11th to meet with this group and to have a discussion and sharing of knowledge as to how we can work together to both build our online faith communities and leverage social media and online platforms to aid us in our mission of sharing the gospel and reaching out to the poor and those on the margins. We shared about how engaging with Social Media and the online world is an area of mission for our church in its own right, and a discussion around how we can now view social media as a "place" where we can encounter with those whom we "meet" there.

We highlighted how we can also be present in this place and use the platforms available to us to share the Good News and draw people to an encounter with the Lord through our own experiences and those of others, as well as seeing our presence in the digital world as an opportunity for mission, reaching out to the poor with their many faces. Oblate Mission Partners

"Pilgrims of Hope: Working Together as the Oblate Family"

A couple of weeks ago both Julie and I attended a "Chapter"/conference held over 4 days titled as above at the Oblate House in Crewe aimed at looking at and increasing the role of the Laity within the Oblate family – the need for this had been discussed previously and the aim was "Looking for new ways of being, that will support Oblates mission to the world"

We began the conference by looking at all the areas where the Oblate "mission" was currently involved in the UK –it is amazing how many things they are part of. Despite St. Joseph's being an Oblate parish, many of us know little more about the Oblates other than they supply our priest and support us here in Colwyn Bay. There are so many organisations that the Oblates organise or are a part of organisations like Friends of St Eugene, Oblates – Lourdes Hospitalité, Oblate projects helping the poor and marginalised – and those "in need" in a number of ways.

Matters discussed were "harmonising ways of belonging" or "sharing ideas that work well" and we then progressed to working in groups on developing a plan for four areas:

- 1) **Formation in Charism** Finding out about the founder of the Friends of St Eugene and the Oblates, the feast days and meeting with others laity and Oblates
- 2) **Communication/Connectedness** –we need to look at our media and how we are best able to connect and share, or connect with other parts of the community.
- 3) **Formation in Communion** bringing people together within the church community.
- 4) **Formation for Mission** helping/giving people the skills and understanding best needed for their roles.

The Oblates want to be more of a part of the communities where they are. Teams have been established to work on these four areas of development following the conference.



The communications team will be responsible for communicating the progress and updates in these areas on the steps to be taken. They want Oblates and Laity to work alongside each other and they are taking practical steps and organising groups to work in each area to plan and implement these strategies making genuine change.

Aside from all the hard work discussing and planning and strategising and thinking, the Oblate house where we did the Congress was a lovely comfortable place to stay, with excellent food. There was a friendly atmosphere with the opportunity to connect with individuals from different regions and backgrounds all there to help with the same purpose. I know there will be other events and retreats held regularly there and I would recommend the centre's hospitality.
